1.0 Introduction

- 1.1 The Sentinel Stroke National Audit Programme (SSNAP) target is that all patients should receive 45 minutes of Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy and Speech and Language Therapy five days per week. Trust compliance in quarter three 2023/2024 was achieving below this target:
 - Occupational Therapy achieving 60 to 70% compliance.
 - Speech and Language Therapy achieving 60 to 70% compliance.
 - Physiotherapy achieving 40 to 60% compliance.

2.0 Background

- 2.1 Stroke therapy groups were taking place within a Ward environment, resulting in limitations through interruptions, space available, and being mindful of other patients within the area.
- 2.2 In September 2023 the sessions were transformed into more specialist stroke therapy groups led by qualified Therapists to better meet patient goals. The group sessions moved to the Gym once a week, enabling a larger number of patients to participate, enabling more equipment to be used, and removing interruptions.
- 2.3 In February 2024, the specialist stroke therapy groups increased to three times a week, with one group each week focused upon Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy and Speech and Language Therapy.

3.0 Actions

- 3.1 Following the Specialist Stroke Therapy Groups being introduced, the following achievements have been delivered:
 - A diverse range of activities have been introduced to encourage patient
 participation in rehabilitation, examples of activities include: seated Tai-Chi, music
 quizzes, painting, mocktail making, parachute games, play your cards right, tuck
 shop style tasks, patient education, paper aeroplane races, team games and
 obstacle courses, and say it, write it, mime it, make it activities.
 - Increased socialisation, wellbeing, and therapeutic opportunities, evidenced through
 patient satisfaction measures, with satisfaction for all groups being 90% or more
 and the highest measure across all three therapies being 'I enjoyed time off the
 Ward' with a 93.4% positive response.
- 3.2 Further actions to be taken include:
 - The impact on direct therapy contact time for Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy and Speech and Language Therapy in SSNAP will continue to be measured.
 - Act on patient feedback, working collaboratively with nursing teams to facilitate patients attending groups to be prepared and ready to take part.
 - Utilise additional available spaces, such as the courtyard gardens as weather permits. Introducing gardening groups and activities.
 - Continue to explore ways to encourage activity and creative approaches to support increased direct therapy contact time.
