Highlights of Public Participation



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (for full details see slides 6 – 12)

- The SaTH Public Assurance Forum, which provides independent assurance on our engagement activities met on the 15 July and 14 October 2024 and the highlights of this meeting are outlined in slides 6-7. David Brown (NED) co-chaired this meeting with Joy Jones (Montgomery Health Forum) from its inception in 2021 until his term of office ended in September 2024 and has been replaced by Professor Trevor Purt (NED)
- The Public Participation Team continues to engage with the public through a regular series of virtual and face-to-face meetings, health lectures and newsletter updates. Our community members (4857) and organisations (429) continue to increase.
- Over the past six months, the Public Participation team have supported 70 HTP events with the public. We have attended 46 face to face meetings and events, and 24 online events. (There was a pause for six weeks following the announcement of a general election, in line with Cabinet Office guidelines).
- Our Social Inclusion Facilitator has been making stronger links with a number of seldom heard groups. This work aligns with our Trust and system focus on Health Inequalities (CORE20PLUS5) and the Equality, Diversity and Inclusion agenda.







Highlights of Public Participation



VOLUNTEERS (for details see slides 22 - 27)

- We have 296 active volunteers within the Trust who have provided 13,893 hours of their time over the last six months. These are across 30+ clinical and non-clinical roles.
- Volunteer's week the first week in June was National Volunteers week and there were a range of events and
 activities that took place this year to celebrate our volunteers, including a Thank You tea party and two
 volunteers going on Radio Shropshire to talk about their experience.
- We have held a number of focus group for our volunteer this quarter including:
 - CQC Briefing Volunteers were given a dedicated CQC briefing from the Director of Nursing.
 - A briefing prior to outpatients closing at RSH
 - A walkabout with volunteers following the closure of outpatients for them to give feedback and suggestions
 - · A briefing following the Channel 4 Dispatches programme to give volunteers an update
- SaTH Volunteers have continued to support wayfinding, following the closure of the Outpatients Entrance at Royal Shrewsbury Hospital as part of the HTP construction works, helping to direct and support patients and visitors.
- 9 volunteers played crucial role in 'Exercise Western', a simulation of a major incident in RSH A&E. Volunteers played the role of patients of a road traffic accident in order for staff in A&E to test how to use Careflow in a major incident situation.
- Cohort 3 of our Volunteer to Career has now finished with volunteers contributing over 665 hours to the
 radiotherapy department. Cohort 4 in midwifery has just started. We are also discussing with Helpforce (a
 national Charity established to support volunteering in health and social care) being one of 10 Trusts in a
 national pilot of a Veterans Volunteer to Career scheme, which has Cabinet Office support







Highlights of Public Participation



SATH CHARITY (for full details see slides 28 - 38)

- Income for the 6 months April Sep 2024 was £343,117 compared to £157,102 in the same period last year.
 Expenditure for the same period was £110,461 compared to £372,557 in 2023 (this included £220,000 spent on the chemotherapy department expansion)
- 167 charitable fund requests were approved across 21 different funds.
- SaTH Charity successfully bid for a £30K grant from NHS
 Charities Together in August 2023. The grant was to develop
 the SaTH Charity brand and visibility in the community. The
 project concluded in August having met all its objectives and
 the post was made permanent at no extra cost by
 restructuring resources supporting the Charity.
- Our supporters continue to fundraise for SaTH Charity, with some events highlighted in this report.
- A 5 year Charity Strategy is in development to provide a clear direction of travel

Community Engagement - Hospital Event Shrewsbury and NHS Trust

- During the first half of this year we held an About Health event sharing information about the Patient Safety Incident Report Framework with Pete Jeffries, Patient Safety Specialist Officer. The event was attended by 11 members of the public and there were lots of very useful questions and Peter offered to support future public focus groups to look at strategy.
- Our July Young People's Academy (YPA) was our busiest yet.
 49 young people completed the day and receiving their certificate and badge. We held a number of sessions at the YPA including, behind-the-scenes tours Basic Life Support Skills session, information on volunteering, HTP and sighted guiding training. Following feedback, we are looking at how we can include more interactive content following at the Young People's Academy.
- 13 people joined the People's Academy held in September at PRH. It was attended by Shrewsbury Town Charitable Foundation and there will be future opportunity to engage with the Foundation.













Social Inclusion

The farming community face numerous health inequalities from both their rurality and the nature of their work. We are proud to continue this work which also catches farmers from across Shropshire.

The Farming Fit partnership initiative (previously the Powys Agri-Wellbeing Scheme – PAWS) officially launched at the Royal Welsh Show on Tuesday 23rd July. **SaTH**Community Engagement have been a partner in this initiative for over two years and have been part of the small task and finish group.

Farming Fit have a dedicated space where they can have blood sugar, BMI, and pulse checks with medical staff as well as engage in 'How are You' chats.

Farming Fit has achieved so far:

- 1,111 engagements undertaken with members of the rural community,
- 1,015 individual health checks carried out, and resulted in 20 people being advised to contact their GP.

These are incredible numbers and show the value and worth of this workstream and the community engagement team continue to be closely involved with its implementation.

Social Inclusion

- In April we were at the Market Drayton Health & Wellbeing Festival, we were again made aware of transport issues facing patients and carers in this more rural area and we connected a local bereavement support group (Jay's Bereavement) with our End of Life and Patient Experience teams.
- We also attended a meeting of Zebra Access in Telford to find out how we can best engage the Deaf Community. We got lots of feedback on how to meaningfully engage with this community.
- As part of our outreach with the homeless community, we have been hearing about experiences of hospital
 discharge and visited the Telford After Care Team (TACT) to find out more. They have invited us to meet their
 Addiction Recovery Chat (ARC) group where many of the service users have direct experience. We have a
 further visit planned to Shrewsbury Ark (for homeless people) and will pass feedback received to our Patient
 Experience team to progress. We have also been talking with and listening to colleagues and service users
 at Telford After Care Team and the Shropshire Recovery Project to see how we can ensure the voice of
 people in addiction recovery services is captured.
- We have been attending Shropshire Council's Joint Strategic Needs Assessment consultation events across
 the county and attended a meeting in Wem and Market Drayton this Quarter. These events have helped us
 to build a picture of Health Inequalities across the county to support future engagement.
- In May, Southeast Community Connector's meeting was held at the Halo Centre in Highley. Over twenty community organisations attended, and SaTH gave out information on a variety of topics, including the Hospitals Transformation Project.
- During August, we met with Public Health Officers in Telford & Wrekin to agree some collaborative
 engagement events through to the end of the year. This is in addition to the work already planned with the
 Gypsy and Traveller community in the borough.

Getting involved with HTP



The Public Participation Team has been supporting our Trust to engage with our local communities around the Hospital Transformation Programme (HTP). The team has organised a number of events including:

- Quarterly focus groups which are aligned to our clinical workstreams. Workstream focus groups have been planned over the next two years which will inform the plans as they develop towards implementation and will continue until the programme is completed. We hold the focus groups every three months, and members can either attend in person or via MS Teams. Focus groups were held in early March, July and September for Medicine and Emergency Care with Surgery, Anaesthetics, Critical Care and Cancer and another for Women & Children's services
- We are holding a series of specialised focus groups based upon the feedback we received from our
 quarterly focus group members and local communities. From April-September we have held HTP focus
 groups for patients with Dementia, Mental Health, Children and Young People, the new RSH Front
 Entrance and for patient who are deaf with BSL translators. In October focus groups were held for our hard
 of hearing communities and our Armed Forces Community, as well as two for GP Patient Participation
 Groups.

- Quarterly About Health HTP events have been delivered using MS Teams in April, July and October and the next About Health event is on the evening of Tuesday 27th January 2025 at 6.30pm. All About Health events are recorded and available on the website

- A bespoke focus group was held for children and young people in May, and over 30 children/young people attended (these were held on a Saturday in two age groups 10 -13 and 14-18)
- A specialist focus group was held for our Deaf/BSL community to gain their valuable feedback.

Volunteers

The Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital

- We currently have 296 active volunteers at the Trust.
- We have held a number of focus group for our volunteers this quarter including:
 - CQC Briefing Volunteers were given a dedicated CQC briefing from Hayley Flavell, Director of Nursing.
 - A briefing prior to outpatients entrance closing at RSH for HTP construction works
 - A walkabout with volunteers following the closure of outpatients to give feedback and suggestions
 - A briefing following the dispatches programme on A&E to give volunteers an update
- Gearing up for new national volunteering data collection the scale of NHS volunteers across the country has been an unknown as data has never been collected at a national level. Since April 2024, SaTH now collects data about its volunteers and submits to NHSE's national database. There are 18 metrics to submit on a quarterly basis
- We have been out and about talking to local schools and colleges about the Public Participation Team and the benefits of volunteering. We currently have 112 volunteers on our Youth Volunteering scheme

- SaTH Volunteers have been integral in supporting the closure of the Outpatients Entrance at Royal Shrewsbury Hospital as part of the HTP construction helping to direct and support patients and visitors
- Since July 2024 Volunteers have been based in the Treatment Centre and Ward Block entrances to help with wayfinding

- 9 volunteers played crucial roles in 'Exercise Western', a simulation of a major incident in RSH A&E. Volunteers played the role of patients in a road traffic accident in order for staff in A&E to test how to use the newly implemented digital system, Careflow in a major incident situation.
- We held our first 'volunteer coffee and catch up' in our new offices at William Farr House, it was well attended and great to see a few new faces.
- The Alcohol Liaison Service welcomed a new volunteer to their team – this is the first 'lived experience' volunteer in the service and they are providing peer support for patients in our care going through detoxification
- A new "Meet and Greet" role was introduced in Women and Children's at PRH. The role aims to welcome and support patients and their families when they come into unit for appointments.
- We are now advertising roles on the national NHS volunteering website 'Find and Apply'

Volunteer to Career (VtC)





Volunteer to Career

The aim of the clinically-led VtC programme is to provide volunteers with career support and interventions including career conversations, mentoring, guidance on career pathways, employability support and mock interviews and skills. Alongside this the volunteers also get the chance to volunteer for 50+ hours within the designated clinical area.

Two Volunteer to Career graduates from Cohort 2 have been in touch to let us know they have recently been successful in gaining employment in the Women and Children's Centre where they previously volunteered

Cohort 3 – Radiotherapy

This cohort was based in radiotherapy at the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital over a 6-month period.

- We are close to the end of the 'formal support' for Cohort 3 and we will celebrate their success in a celebration evening.
- To date, just over 665 hours of volunteering have been contributed to Radiotherapy from this cohort of Volunteers
- A volunteer from Cohort 3 has already been successful in gaining employment in the Radiotherapy department.

Cohort 4 - Midwifery:

- We held a 'Find out more' session on MS Teams for Cohort 4. This was well attended, and Rachel Armstrong (VtC Clinical lead and Head of non-medical education) and midwife Naomi Parry spoke about the programme. The cohort also heard from a VtC Graduate and now SaTH employee Rachael Campbell about her positive experience and journey on the programme.
- Cohort 4 are due to start their volunteering/training sessions in October/November

SaTH Charity Highlights

- Income for the six months from April-Sep 2024 was £343,117 compared to £157,102 in the same period last year.
 Expenditure for the same period was £110,461 compared to £372,557 in 2023 (however this included £220,000 spent on chemotherapy department expansion).
- During this period SaTH Charity had:
 - 664 monetary donation entries registered on the charity database, this is more than usual and the increase was down to the successful charity abseil and Lake Vrywny half marathon that took place during this period.
 - **52** donations were 'In Memory' donations
 - 959 members of staff are now playing the staff lottery
 - SaTH Charity had 176 requests during the quarter for support from SaTH Charity, 72 of which were to the staff Small Things/Big Difference Fund.









SaTH Expenditure

The Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital

- There were **167** approved requests for charitable funds. Examples of approved funding included:
- A sinus navigation kit for Ear Nose and Throat enabling greater clarity during procedures in theatres. £6,417
- Improvements to the Critical Care Garden, new slabbed area, additional seating, gazebo and a slope enabling patients during rehab to experience fresh air whilst bed bound. Their family can join them to feel the sun on their face and take a break from the unit. £12,570
- High-quality, portable full-HD monitors purchased for Urology to carry out Cystoscopy within a ward setting, freeing up theatre capacity and reducing the time from requesting to having the procedure a £4,500
- Upgrade of furniture in parents' flats including an electric raise bed for the Neonatal Unit to improve the environment for parents staying on the ward. £4,894
- Replacement furniture for Swan Suite Ward 15/16, the room will be used by relatives to have sensitive conversations about- their loved one's end-of-life care. £1,332

NHS CT Development Grant (Month 12)



The NHS CT funded grant to develop the SaTH Charity brand and visibility in the community concluded in August having met all its objectives.

The main element of the grant was the funding of a Charity Communications Officer, based on the success and progress achieved the role has been extended until August 2026, with no extra cost to the Charity following an internal team restructure.

Key points from the project:

- The increase in awareness gained from the project has meant the charity achieved the three key performance indicators for the project which were
- 1. Outcome: Increase in brand awareness Target of 10%

ACHIEVED – Survey has completed and shows an increase of 25% of participants hearing about us on social media, this is compared with 2% in the previous survey.

2. Outcome: Increase in donations to the Charity - Target of 10%

ACHIEVED – Compare data to last year after 6 months (February 2024). In the period October to March 2022/23 £140,203 vs the same period 2023/24 was £273,822, this is a 51% increase. Overall, the year ending the charity received £357,000 2022/23 compared to 2023/24 saw a 39% increase in donations with £471,251.

3. Outcome: Increase in number of Charity supporters - Target of 25% and this will be mainly community with some increase in corporate supporters

- The Public Assurance Forum to meet on 13 January 2025
- Continue to support staff with any future service changes engagement

- A Young People's Academy and a People's Academy to be delivered in Q3

- Other Christmas plans are underway included a visit from RAF Shawbury and a plan for the distribution of presents (usually for children in hospital over the Christmas period)
- The Volunteer Celebration Event which is part of the Trust Awards takes place in November.
- The Youth Volunteer Programme is open for applications and we are looking forward to welcoming the new volunteers soon.
- Work with Helpforce to set up the Veterans to Career pilot and attend the House of commons reception to look at strengthening the NHS Volunteer offer at the end of November
